<p>ALBERTA</p>	<p>Alberta has now officially opened the pathway for regulated iGaming and sports betting. The AGLC has begun accepting registration applications from interested iGaming operators and service providers. Geolocation providers, affiliate marketers, and PSPs are not required to be licensed.</p> <p>The market will have many similarities to Ontario with respect to ad restrictions and RG. There will be an Alberta specific self exclusion program that operators are required to integrate. There are operational similarities too, including the need to enter into a commercial operating agreement with the Alberta iGaming Corporation (AiGC), the agency that will manage and oversee the competitive market.</p> <p>There will be an 80/20 NGR revenue split between the province and operators, but after 3% (first nations) and 1% (RG) are removed from GGR.</p> <p>Alberta is running a first-come, first-served application regime, meaning early applicants may secure competitive advantages ahead of go-live</p> <p>Helpful Links:</p> <p>Standards and Technical Standards Application Guide iGaming Strategy</p>	<p>No firm date has not yet been set, expected to launch later in 2026</p>	<p>iDEA will continue to monitor developments in Alberta, and provide updates. .</p>
<p>ILLINOIS</p>	<p>Bills have been introduced in the House and Senate to authorize iGaming.</p>	<p>May 31 - Session Adjourns</p>	<p>iDEA will continue to monitor the bills and will seek to testify should there be a hearing.</p>

	<p>The bills would permit land-based casinos to offer iGaming directly or through up to three platform partners, but restricts any casino that has cut more than 25% of its workforce from obtaining a license.</p> <p>The bill has a 25% tax rate. \$250,000 initial internet gaming license; \$100,000 renewal; \$100,000 management service provider license; \$75,000 supplier license.</p> <p>Similar bills have been introduced in previous session, and have not advanced beyond the Committee.</p> <p>The opposition from the VLT industry remains, and also from organized labor. <p>INDIANA</p>	<p>In a surprising move, the House did not approve the iLottery bill, thereby killing any mobile gaming expansion efforts for the year.</p>	<p>End of February: Session Adjournment target</p>	<p>iDEA is monitoring the situation and connecting with local stakeholders to continue to advocate for iGaming.</p>
<p>MAINE</p>	<p>On 1/08 the Maine governor signed an iGaming bill that had been sitting on her desk since last summer. The bill gives the state’s gaming tribes the exclusive right to offer online gaming. There are 4 tribes who currently have OSB partnerships with mobile operators.</p> <p>For many of our operator members this market opening will not likely result in an opportunity to offer a B2C product in the state. HOWEVER, it does help to build timely momentum as states like Virginia and Indiana</p>	<p>Bill becomes effective 90 days after the session concludes. Currently set for April 15, putting enactment in mid July (pending potential challenge)</p>	<p>iDEA will monitor any developments around this new law and coordinate with members if action is needed to maintain it.</p>

	<p>consider iGaming legislation. Not to mention a biz opportunity for iDEA's supplier members.</p> <p>Opponents of the bill have pledged to seek to overturn this law by seeking a voter referendum. If they pursue this path it could stall enactment of the law until after the November elections.</p> <p>The Chair of the Gaming Commission testified this week, that barring any disruption of the enactment of the bill the market should be operational in early 2027.</p> <p>This week, one of the state's non-tribal owned casinos filed a lawsuit claiming race-based discrimination for only including tribes to offer iGaming. <p>MARYLAND</p>	<p>Working off the bills that were introduced in the House and Senate last year as the basis for this new bill, Senator Ron Watson is readying an iGaming bill for introduction. He reached out to iDEA asking for some comments to questions he had from Legislative Counsel, which we've responded to. You can see our comments here</p> <p>This week the Senator provided an update bill, which improves the tax rate, but does not simplify the licensing structure. We've provided a full update on the bill that is available on the Member Portal.</p>	<p>Feb 9th – Deadline to introduce bills in Senate</p> <p>Feb 13th – Deadline to introduce House bills</p>	<p>We continue to speak with Senator Watson about making these changes. <p>MASS</p>	<p>On 11/13 iDEA participated in a hearing on H4431. The hearing covered several gaming bills including one from Senator Keenan which would impose onerous controls on the industry that aim to curb problem gambling. His bill is S. 302.</p>	<p>Nov 13 – Hearing date</p>	<p>iDEA was an active participate in the hearing both explaining the merits of iGaming and defending against the opponents claims.</p> <p>We are following up with every committee member to continue to be a resource to them</p>

	<p>The discussion around iGaming reflected a mix of support and opposition. iDEA presented on a panel alongside the bill's sponsor and DraftKings, while responsible gaming advocates, unions, and NAAIG voiced their opposition to the measure.</p> <p>You can find a recording of the full hearing here – iGaming discussion begins around the 40:00 minute mark.</p> <p>Lawmakers seemed sympathetic to the RG witnesses who presented, but are genuinely interested in learning more about the scope of problem gambling and what can be done to prevent it.</p>		<p>moving forward.</p> <p>You can read our submitted testimony on the Web Portal.</p>
<p>NEW YORK</p>	<p>Senate and House bills have been re-ordered to the respective gaming committees. Chair Addabbo is the Senate sponsor and Chair Woerner is the House sponsor.</p> <p>Challenges remain with strong opposition from the hotel worker trades and very little leadership coming from the Governor on this issue.</p> <p>Biggest opportunity is to tie iGaming as a pay-for for the ambitious social agenda being pushed by NYC mayor who will have a tremendous amount of influence over the legislature this year.</p>	<p>Session Starts – 01/07/2026</p>	<p>iDEA continues to work with Senator Addabbo closely and we are also engaging with Chair Woerner.</p> <p>We recently submitted written testimony regarding Responsible Gaming. <p>OHIO</p>	<p>iDEA met with Ohio lawmakers at the NCLGS conference – Rep. Bride Sweeney, Vice Chair of the House Finance Committee & Minority Leader Dani Issacsohn. It was an excellent meeting and we discussed a variety of issues from consumer protection, impact of land-based gaming and revenue potential.</p> <p>Leader Issacsohn called himself an iGaming skeptic, but has become more open to it because of education efforts from iDEA and others. Rep. <p>VIRGINIA</p>	<p>On 02/05 HB 161 passed out of the House General Laws Committee on a 13-8 vote. The bill has been amended to include the provisions that were added in the Senate bill. It also was amended to include a “reenactment clause” which would require the legislation to be approved by the legislature again next year. Including this provision was necessary for the bill to advance, but we will be working to remove it later in the process, if the bills get to a conference committee.</p> <p>The bill now goes to the House Appropriations Committee.</p> <p>SB 118 is still awaiting to be heard in the Senate Finance Committee. It should come up next week. There are a number of amendments currently being floated that would impact the structure of the bill, including a reduction of skins, and a way to include minority participation. Another would seek to create another fund taken from iGaming operator GGR that would be used support the land-based casino industry.</p>	<p>Week of Feb 9 – House Approps</p> <p>Sen. <p>ARIZONA</p>	<p>In Arizona, the Governor has proposed increasing the sports betting tax rate from 10% to 45% in her budget proposal announced last week.</p> <p>Though not all are specific to the sports tax increase, there is already sweeping opposition to her budget in its entirety from the Republican-led legislature. The Governor is a Democrat while Republicans control both the House and Senate.</p> <p>Though the budget process is in the very early stages, ultimately some increase of the tax rate is expected in a final product.</p>	<p>June 30, 2026 – Deadline for state to finalize budget.</p>	<p>iDEA is monitoring the situation and coordinating with stakeholder. We will engage as we have in other states to successfully hold back large tax increases.</p>
<p>GEORGIA</p>	<p>A sports betting bill was re-introduced this week, by Rep. Hatchett, HB 910. This bill does not require a constitutional amendment. While a preferable approach, it has run into opposition as lawmakers believe that this should ultimately go to the ballot.</p> <p>The Speaker of the House continues to be less than enthusiastic about pushing this policy.</p>	<p>Session Convenes: Jan 12, 2026</p> <p>Adjourns: April 9, 2026</p>	<p>iDEA is engaging with stakeholders and sharing perspectives about sports wagering legalization.</p>
<p>HAWAII</p>	<p>We anticipate new sports betting bills to be introduced this year. <p>MARYLAND</p>	<p>HB29 was subject to a hearing on 02/05. The Lottery/Gaming Commission supports the bill which would give them broad authority to limit promotional deductions.</p> <p>HB 46 is a bill that would create a pilot program, requiring operators to geofence certain areas of select college campuses. This is being proposed to evaluate if it can be a way to prevent underage gambling and problem gambling on college campuses. This bill was subject to a hearing earlier this year, but was then removed from the hearing calendar. It has not been rescheduled.</p>	<p>April 13 – Adjournment date</p>	<p>iDEA is engaging with lawmakers on these proposals.</p>
<p>MISSISSIPPI</p>	<p>HB 1518 passed the House on 02/04. Similar legislation was passed in the past three legislative session in the House, but has been blocked in the Senate.</p> <p>The Senate Gaming Chair continues to oppose mobile sports betting legalization.</p> <p>The bill amends the constitution, thereby it requires a 3/5 yes votes to pass.</p> <p>NaaiG has come out to oppose mobile sports betting expansion. This is the first time they have focused their opposition on a sports-only state.</p>	<p>Session Adjourns: April 4, 2026</p>	<p>iDEA will monitor developments in MS.</p>
<p>NEW YORK</p>	<p>This week the Gaming Commission announced it is reviewing all player prop bets and same-game parlays and it will consider eliminating some bet types based on the results.</p> <p>They also sent a letter (linked) to sports leagues reminding them to formally request limitations</p>	<p>Session Starts - 01/07/2026</p>	<p>iDEA will engage with lawmakers to advise on these legislative and regulatory proposals.</p> <p>We've connected with Senator Addabbo to discuss iGaming and defensive strategy on sports betting.</p>

SOUTH DAKOTA	<p>Legislation to put sports betting legalization on the ballot this November is moving in the Senate.</p> <p>SJR 504 would require tethering with Deadwood casinos and that servers must be located within the city of Deadwood.</p> <p>The bill passed the Senate Taxation Committee and will now go to the Senate floor.</p>	Week of Feb 9 – Potential Senate floor vote on the bill.	iDEA will continue to monitor the legislation.
WISCONSIN	<p>House Bill 601, is expected to return the agenda in the coming weeks.</p> <p>The bills would leverage IGRA to allow sports bets made by a person located in Wisconsin using a mobile or other electronic device if the server used to conduct the wager is physically located on a federally recognized American Indian tribe’s Indian lands and if the sports wager is conducted pursuant to a compact between a tribe and Wisconsin.</p>	Jan 13 – 22: Next floor session.	iDEA will continue to monitor the Wisconsin Legislature.

MARYLAND	<p>Maryland has issued several new proposed regulations related to sports wagering that can be found here.</p> <p>These new rules posted on 12/15 focus on data security of player information, self exclusions and advertising.</p> <p>We are continuing to engage with the regulator on a proposal to reduce the promotional deduction threshold to 5%. We understand that the rules will be put on hold through the state legislative review committee, but only as a temporary solution.</p>		iDEA has proactively reached out to the Commission and shared our concerns with the proposed amendment.
OHIO	<p>The Gaming Commission has been seeking to update the KYC/ID standards in the state to curb fraud related to identity.</p> <p>They have issued several draft rules since last year and on 01/08 issued their latest draft.</p> <p>This version moves away from the prescriptive and problematic measures that were previously proposed and creates an opportunity for OSBs to have a thorough, risk-based approach, to fraud prevention.</p>	Comment Deadline: 5pm on January 22.	iDEA will monitor activity at the OCCC on this matter and weigh-in as needed.
