INDIANA <i>(iGaming)</i>	The long session of the Indiana General Assembly has concluded, with both chambers adjourning just before 2AM on Apr 28. Neither iGaming nor iLottery were authorized in any form during this legislative session.	Adjourned	iDEA continues to work with key legislators and stakeholders in Indiana.
MASSACHUSETTS <i>(Sports)</i>	<p>On July 24, Massachusetts Joint Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure held a hearing and heard testimony on S. 182.</p> <p>As background, this bill would make sportsbooks subject to Massachusetts deceptive advertising laws.</p> <p>The bill number for SD. 766 was changed to S. 182 and was then referred to the Joint Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure. More information available in the Member Portal.</p>	Nov. 11 – adjournment	iDEA will monitor the activity of the Massachusetts legislature.
MINNESOTA <i>(Sports)</i>	<p>The Minnesota Legislature adjourned without passing sports betting legislation.</p> <p>May 12: the Minnesota Senate Tax Committee passed the Senate sports wagering bill out of committee and sent the bill to the Senate Finance Committee. However, it is unlikely that sports betting legislation will pass in Minnesota this year.</p> <p>May 11: the Rules and Administration Committee reported the bill out of Committee and sent the bill to the Tax Committee.</p> <p>May 10: Minnesota Senate State and Local Government and Veterans Committee passed the Senate sports wagering bill 8-5.</p> <p>All MN bills can be accessed in the Member Portal.</p>	Adjourned	
NEW HAMPSHIRE <i>(iGaming)</i>	Apr 26: House Ways and Means Committee unanimously recommended against passage of SB 104 (Lang). However, the bill can still be called for a vote on the House floor. As background, SB 104 would authorize online gaming in New Hampshire and direct net proceeds to a community college education scholarship fund. The NH		

	<p>Lottery Commission would choose online casino operators in a competitive bidding process.</p> <p>Mar 23: the Finance Committee adopted an amendment to the bill removing the legalization of online slots to address concerns from the state’s retail-based charitable casinos.</p>		
<p>NEW YORK <i>(iGaming)</i></p>	<p>Mar 14: Assembly and Senate released their one-house budgets; neither proposal included iGaming revenue.</p> <p>Feb 27: NY State Assembly passed A1118, sponsored by Assemb. Clyde Vanel. Proposal calls for sports betting companies to include info in advertising that highlights the potential dangers of legal gambling. Bill moved to the Senate where it was referred to the Racing, Gaming and Wagering Committee.</p> <p>Feb 15: Sen. Addabbo filed bill S.4856 to legalize iGaming. The bill would offer an online license to each sports betting operator; the proposed tax rate is 30.5%.</p> <p>Feb 1: Gov. Hochul unveiled her 2024 executive budget; legal iGaming was not included.</p> <p>Jan 31: NY Senate Racing, Gaming, and Wagering Committee and Assembly Racing and Wagering Committee conducted hearing on mobile sports betting. Operators testified need to lower 51% tax rate.</p> <p>Jan 17: Sen. Addabbo filed S.1962 that would tie reduction in tax rate to increased number of operators. Tax rate would be lowered to 50% if there are 10-12 operators, 35% for 13-14; and 25% for 15+.</p> <p>Other bills we’re monitoring include S 1550, which would require all advertisements to include warnings about the potentially harmful and addictive effects of gambling, and A 1056, which would create a problem gambling advisory council.</p> <p>All bills can be accessed in the Member Portal (NY state page).</p>		
<p>NORTH CAROLINA <i>(Sports + iGaming)</i></p>	<p>The NC Legislature’s expected vote on the budget is September 12.</p> <p>NC’s Governor and Legislature is attempting to insert land-based casino and VLT licenses in the state budget. iDEA is already at work to have iGaming included in the budget as well. The casinos and VLT’s</p>	<p>September 12- Expected budget vote</p>	<p>iDEA will monitor the activity of the North Carolina legislature.</p> <p>On June 07, the North Carolina House of Representatives concurred with the changes that the</p>

	<p>have been lobbying this behind the scenes for the past few months and the VLT lobby is trying to make sure that iGaming legalization doesn't make it into the budget.</p> <p>June 14: Governor Roy Cooper signed H 347 into law. NC has 12 months to launch online sports betting. A copy of the ratified bill can be accessed here.</p> <p>June 7: NC House concurred with changes made by the Senate to the sports betting bill. The bill now heads to the Governor; anticipated he will sign.</p> <p>June 1: H 347 passed out of the Senate. Since changes were made in the Senate, the bill goes back to House for a concurrence vote. Sports betting will launch no later than 12 months after the bill becomes law.</p> <p>May 24: the Senate Committee on Commerce and Insurance amended and then reported H 347 to the Senate Committee on Finance. Among the changes is increasing tax rate to 18%.</p>		<p>Senate made to the sports betting bill. The bill now heads to the Governor, where it is anticipated that he will sign it. You can read a copy of the bill in the Member Portal.</p>
<p>OHIO <i>(Sports)</i></p>	<p>OH's final budget includes increased sports wagering tax rate of 20%.</p> <p>The Ohio budget conference committee started on June 22. The House is fighting hard against the 10% tax increase.</p> <p>June 15: the Senate passed their version of the budget (includes the increased sports gaming tax); now heads to a conference committee.</p> <p>The Senate's substitute budget bill reinstated Gov. DeWine's proposed doubling of the sports gaming tax from 10% to 20%. With education budget negotiations being an intricate part of the process, we have been informed that a deal has been struck on education and the funding will come from either the Rainy Day Fund and the extra revenues the state has from what was originally projected in the budget estimate.</p> <p>In his recommended two-year state budget proposal (line 73672), Gov. DeWine proposed doubling the tax on sports betting from 10% to 20%.</p>		<p>iDEA will monitor the activity of the Ohio legislature.</p> <p>On June 27, iDEA General Counsel, Jeff Ifrah sent a letter to members of Ohio's HB 33 Conference Committee with recommendations related to the state Senate's proposed tax increase on sports betting. <p>RHODE ISLAND <i>(iGaming)</i></p>	<p>RI's Governor has signed the iGaming bills, which take effect on March 1, 2024.</p> <p>June 13: the House Finance Committee recommended passage of substitute B for S 948. On the same day, the House Finance Committee</p>		

	<p>amended the House version of the iGaming bill, H 6348 and recommended passage. The bills mirror each other.</p> <p>June 15: the House passed both substituted bills. The Senate concurred with the changes to the Senate bill and passed the House bill. Both bills have been sent to the Governor. If signed into law, the bills will take effect on March 1, 2024. Note: While only one of these bills must go through the entire legislative process to become law, in Rhode Island, it is not uncommon for both the identical Senate and House versions to be enacted into law.</p> <p>June 6: the Senate Special Legislation and Veterans Affairs Committee recommended passage of bill substitute A for S 948 (a bill that would legalize iGaming) and placed the bill on the Senate calendar.</p> <p>June 8: the Senate passed the substitute bill A.</p> <p>May 10: Hearing on S 948 in Senate Special Legislation and Veterans Affairs Committee; Committee recommended the bill be held for further study.</p> <p>Apr 27: State Senate President Dominick Ruggerio filed S 948, a bill to legalize iGaming. The legislation would allow the state’s Division of Lotteries to authorize online slots and table games at Bally’s retail casinos in the state.</p>		
VERMONT <i>(Sports)</i>	<p>June 14: Gov. Phil Scott signed H 127 into law. The Vermont Department of Liquor and Lottery will be the regulatory body that oversees sports wagering. It is expected that sports wagering will launch by January 2024.</p> <p>May 9: VT House concurred on changes made by the Senate to the sports wagering bill. The bill now heads to Gov. Phil Scott, and it is anticipated that he will sign.</p> <p>May 3: the Senate passed H 127 (Birong) with various amendments that do the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Alters the fee structure to bring in more money per operator, spread over multiple years. • iEliminates cap on advertising, allowing Dept. of Liquor and Lottery (DLL) to negotiate that with operators. • Bans advertising on college campuses. • Prohibits advertising on products marketed to those under 	<p>Adjourned</p>

	<p>A Sports Wagering Advisory Council has been formed. The council will advise the full commission and provide additional voices who have direct knowledge of the sports betting industry.</p> <p>The Kentucky Horse Racing Commission (KHRC) announced that on Aug. 28, at 6 a.m. EDT Kentuckians can pre-register an account with approved mobile applications.</p> <p>The KHRC announced that licensing applications are being reviewed and will be voted on at a meeting of the full commission on August 22.</p> <p>Kentucky’s emergency sports wagering regulations were passed; effective July 10. A summary of the regulations and info on public hearing and comment period, along with links and contact info for license applications is available here.</p> <p>Retail go-live is Sept 7, 2023 at 10am EDT; online go-live is Sept 28, 2023 at 6 am EDT.</p> <p>Initial intel indicates there will be emergency rules and they will allow operators currently licensed in other states to operate in KY. The Gov is pushing hard to launch before NFL 2023 season.</p> <p>Because several horses died at Churchill Downs, the venue closed and the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission temporarily delayed work on the sports wagering regulations.</p> <p>The Kentucky sports betting bill – HB 551 (Meredith) will become effective on Jun 28, and the KHRC will then have six months from that date (until Dec. 28) to promulgate regulations, although it is expected that the rules will be drafted much sooner.</p>	<p>applications.</p> <p>September 7, 2023 - Retail go-live date</p> <p>September 28, 2023 - Online go-live date</p>	
<p>MAINE <i>(Sports)</i></p>	<p>The sports betting rules have been submitted to the AG’s office for review and are expected to be approved in November. Sports betting licenses will be issued on the day the rules are approved.</p> <p>May 17: Maine's Gambling Control Unit released new proposed regulations governing sports betting; substantial revisions were made. MASSACHUSETTS <i>(Sports)</i>	<p>Aug. 24: The Massachusetts Gaming Commission (MGC) voted to issue a waiver to the data privacy regulation until November 17, 2023. During the waiver period, operators are asked to provide further details and implementation plans/timelines for meeting the requirements. There will also be a roundtable discussion soon to facilitate further discussion around data privacy and the data privacy regulation.</p> <p>Aug 8: MGC adopted a data privacy regulation, with an effective date of September 1, 2023. A copy of the regulation can be accessed here.</p> <p>June 29: MGC voted to require inclusion of “21+” language with sports wagering operator logos on signage or a fixed structure in a sports venue. Operators and sports venues have 90 days to comply with the new rule.</p> <p>June 15: the MGC approved a waiver to the referral promotions prohibition through August 1.</p> <p>May 23: MGC unanimously voted to continue to tax sports betting operators on revenue generated by promotional play.</p>	<p>November 17, 2023-Data Privacy Regulation Waiver ends</p>	<p>iDEA will monitor the activity of the MGC.</p>
NEW YORK <i>(Sports)</i>	<p>Aug 4: This week’s New York State Register included two gaming-related regulatory proposals. The first is proposed regulations for sports wagering advertising, marketing, and promotion, including restriction of advertising to colleges and college students. There is a 60-day comment period, which ends on Oct 1, 2023.</p> <p>The second is revised regulations regarding the operation of interactive fantasy sports. The first iteration was posted on July 20, 2022, and following an initial comment period, the Commission published these revised regulations in this week’s edition. <p>NORTH CAROLINA <i>(Sports)</i></p>	<p>The North Carolina Lottery Commission (NCLC) has hired Sterl Carpenter as Deputy Executive Director to lead its gaming compliance and sports betting division. He previously worked for the Massachusetts Gaming Commission.</p> <p>The North Carolina Lottery Commission is forming a sub-committee that will draft the sports wagering rules and guide the promulgation process.</p>		<p>iDEA will monitor the activity of the North Carolina Lottery Commission.</p>
<p>OHIO <i>(Sports)</i></p>	<p>June 28: The Ohio Casino Control Commission (OCCC) sent an email to sports gaming stakeholders requesting that each operator confirm it does not, or has ceased offering, any directed consumer promotions, based on non-gaming consumer transactions, no later than 5pm on Fri, July 7, 2023.</p> <p>In the same email, the OCCC stated it is aware that further administrative rules regarding these types of promotions would assist the industry.
